#### BIRDSONG'S FALL PLANT SALE Saturday, November 2, 2024 9am to 1pm

**Some featured shade trees....** North Florida and South Georgia trees have been devastated this year by storms. We have lost our soul-nourishing shade. November is the best time of year to plant new trees and shrubs. Here are a few of our best big trees that we'll have at the November 2 plant sale.

The Live Oak is our finest shade tree. It withstands storms better than other trees — witness the 200– to 300-year-old Live Oaks that are still standing in the neighborhoods of Tallahassee hit by the May tornadoes. Live Oaks grow faster than you might think, especially in their first 30 years. If you plant a 3-gallon size Live Oak now you will have shade in 10 years.

Tulip Poplar is our second fastest-growing tree (after Sycamore). It has interesting spatulate leaves and beautiful peach, green, and yellow tulip-shaped flowers which you may never see — they will be high up and hidden in the dense shade-giving foliage of the mature tree.

Nuttall Oak is a medium sized oak tree, but it is fast-growing, and it has the showiest Fall foliage of all our oaks.

#### TAKE A CHILD OUTSIDE For The Holidays! Saturday, December 7 9:30-Noon



## THANK YOU! To our Donors

We wish to thank the 211 donors who generously responded to the last two Summer Appeals: the 2022 House and Garden Improvements Project and the 2023 New Tractor appeal. To honor these donors, we held an event on October 12<sup>th</sup> to show what has been completed on the House and Garden Project and to let people go on a hayride through the fall woods drawn by the new tractor! Our guests were welcome to walk through the house to see the improvements and gather outdoors on the front lawn to enjoy music by Lance Farlow, have a seafood dinner provided by the Wharf, and enjoy drinks, dessert, and conversation with fellow Birdsong donors. We enjoyed gathering with so many kind friends and supporters to share our communal efforts!

To all our donors, including those who were not able to attend, we want to express our sincere thanks for your support for these last two appeals and for caring about Birdsong's present and future well-being. Because of your generosity we were able to complete the House portion of the project and make great headway on the Garden portion.

Regarding the Garden, we learned an important lesson early on with our first efforts to remove invasives. It became evident that our original request for funding, to have a landscaping crew visit four times to clear out invasives and then replant the House Garden, was highly unrealistic – we have had the crew out eight times so far and are still working on the invasives part. From here out, once more invasives are removed and we can plant new shrubs and flowering plants without concern about using herbicides, we will need to find a way to fund ongoing gardening and maintenance in the main garden surrounding the House. Meanwhile, a lot has been accomplished and we are very pleased with the progress so far.

We count Birdsong very fortunate to have such a committed donor community and we hope our donors are pleased with the results. For those who could not attend, please come out soon to enjoy the realization of the House and Garden Project.

· We'd like to let you know about three other projects that were not part of the original House and Garden Improvements Project appeal requests, but are now in beautiful shape for visitors, donors, and staff to enjoy:

The Butterfly Garden Our dedicated Butterfly Garden volunteers have worked hard over the past year to make some significant improvements in the Butterfly Garden and the results are beautiful! The team replaced sod on the main trail, cleared and developed new garden beds on the south berm and east triangles, and planted *Gaillardia* and other flowering plants that have been enthusiastically greeted by pollinators! They also installed a new cedar entrance arbor. All this was done above and beyond their usual commitment to weeding, watering, and maintenance of this valuable garden. Thank you, Donna Legare, Ann Morrow, Beth Grant, Connie Lechnar and our other garden volunteers for making this place special for both visitors and butterflies. This is a great time to visit the Garden – the weather is still warm, and the bees and butterflies are a constant presence on the blooming tickseed and other fall flowers.

The Gift Shop Pre-Covid, the Gift Shop had been managed beautifully by our dear friends Winnie and Wolf Adolph. We closed during the pandemic but when that was over, both Winnie and Wolf were experiencing health issues and were not able to come back, and we were very busy with the easement and other significant priorities, so the gift shop remained closed. This summer Lynn Brown, our Office Manager, organized the re-opening of the gift shop to coincide with our Donor Appreciation Event on October 12<sup>th</sup>. Led by Lynn's vision for a revitalized shop, a group effort took place, and the space was transformed. Please stop by to see it on your next visit to Birdsong. It is beautiful and interesting and stocked with new merchandise, including some extraordinary bird houses donated by artist and wood craftsman Buddy Hull, plus much more. Our Construction Crew solved this problem by installing a new outdoor ceiling fan and a silver heat-reflecting tarp on the roof. It made a huge difference, and our Greeters are now comfortable even on a hot day!

## LAND MANAGEMENT WORKDAYS Thursdays: November 7 and 21, December 5 and 19 9am to noon

It was a long, hot, stormy summer, topped off with a close call from Hurricane Helene. Although we are currently in a drought, the rainy summer resulted in lots of growth, and between that and the trees and branches downed by Helene, we have plenty of land management challenges. We'd really appreciate your help with clearing fallen trees and trimming overhanging limbs and brush that is encroaching on the trails. We also have our ongoing issues, such as invasive plant removal and cutting down the thriving sweetgum and pine saplings that are showing up everywhere. We also want to do as much preparation as we can for the upcoming burn season.

If you enjoy working outdoors with good-natured companions, please join us on these workdays. Alan Parker, our land and site expert, will lead these efforts and be joined by members of our volunteer burn crew. They would be pleased to have your help. These projects are great learning experiences and will help get things in shape for burning. Your contribution will be much appreciated.

Be prepared for the weather and bring work gloves. If you have a favorite pair of loppers, a saw, or other tools, you are welcome to bring them, but we do have tools on site. There will be water and a snack on the truck; bring a sandwich if you want to have lunch together and we'll provide drinks and dessert.

If the weather turns out to be good for burning, we will pivot to a burn day and that means meeting at a different time of day, so please do let us know if you are planning to attend so you can be informed of any potential time change. #### WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT NOTES October 14, 2024

Weather Today is a beautiful fall day. Sunny, breezy, a cloudless blue sky, and cool. Ever since the last newsletter, however, we've been on a rollercoaster, weatherwise. We had Hurricane Debby in August, followed by multiple big storms with lots of rain and extended periods of extreme heat. Then Hurricane Helene came along, with a terrifying track prediction, straight at us, and then it came ashore to the east. Somehow our area escaped the worst of the impact, and it caused no damage to the buildings at Birdsong, but we did lose a lot of old trees; some were beloved old landmarks which we deeply miss. As hard as that has been, given what has happened elsewhere we have no complaints. Ever since, we've benefited in many ways from an extended cold front which in part kept Hurricane Milton on a track to the south. For the past three weeks, this front has provided the beautiful fall weather we are experiencing today: cool, with a sunny clear sky, and no rain. Even though it is lovely weather now, perfect for going out in the woods to enjoy the fall scenery, we are starting to see a few signs of drought, so a good rain would not go unappreciated. We recorded 8.54 inches of rain in the month of September, including 4.95 after Hurricane Helene on September 27, but since then we have had no rain at all in the month of October, a true October drought.

The wildflowers got started a little later than expected this fall but are now blooming effusively all over the property. The *Liatris* is having a phenomenal year and can be found in beautiful stands scattered all over the property, especially in the fields and other grassy areas where the trees are widely spaced. What a stunning wildflower it is. "Blazing Star", a single wand of purple flowers along the stem, slightly curved and waving in the breeze. We are of course enjoying the broad expanses of vibrant goldenrod mixed with Narrowleaved Sunflower and Pittyopsis with lavender Mistflower mixed in. The tall native grasses with their silver, bronze and golden seedheads are emerging now, too, very impressive, backlit and glowing in the sun.

The Gin House Field looks a little different this year. It is full of beautiful wildflowers, but we do not have a massive bloom of *Agalinis* like we have had the past two years. This beautiful pink wildflower is scattered across the field in patches among other gorgeous flowers like Daisy Fleabane, *Liatris*, *Pittyopsis*, and Goldenrod. We do not know why things are so different, but there are just fewer

Agalinis plants this year. It is still well worth going on a leisurely walk through the field; the vibrant wildflowers and grasses are waist-to-head-high along the trails, and stretch out to the trees on the horizon. It is a wonderful sight. They are all covered with happy busy pollinators too, another plus!

With a few cold nights in recent weeks, we are seeing some leaf color out in the woods. One of the most noticeable trees, with leaves turning russet and maroon and deep purple, is our Sweet Gum. We are often annoyed by its prolific emergence where we do not want it, but this time of year we get very ambivalent – it is beautiful!

It is a good berry and fruit season this fall. The Yaupon Holly is really putting on a show, as are Magnolia, Cherry Laurel, Wax Myrtle, and Crabapple. The birds and wildlife are feasting!

Land Management Alan had a long hot summer of mowing trails that relentlessly grew back within two weeks, along with cleaning up fallen trees, debris, and branches from the frequent storms and two hurricanes. We are fortunate to have Mike Carter close by, so when the big storms come through Alan has a work partner to help manage the really tough jobs of moving huge trees off the trails and so on. I think we've seen more of Mike this year than any in memory. At least now the growing season is finally winding down so mowing is almost over for the year.

We will now be turning our attention to getting ready for burning in the coming months, so Alan will be harrowing and trimming fire lanes, identifying new snags to protect, and getting the equipment prepared. We have a big season ahead of us, now that we have a wonderful working tractor we can rely on while burning!

Praying Mantis In the last newsletter we told you about a male praying mantis we had observed on a Daisy Fleabane stem near the Barn. As promised, we continued to check on him for the next few days before we closed for break. He was not there the following three or four days, so we must assume that he made his final molt into his adult stage where his newly developed wings became functional and he was able to fly away. We really enjoyed that opportunity to watch a single insect over a period of three or so weeks; he was fascinating. We hope he flew off and found a mate and is leading a long and enjoyable praying mantis life.

On October 3<sup>rd</sup>, I went to load something into my car and noticed a praying mantis on the silver passenger-side mirror cowling. I got very excited because it had the exact same patterning as the male we'd been watching, but this one was a bit larger

and had a heavy, shapely abdomen – a female! She displayed the same interest and curiosity as her male counterpart, turning her small triangular face to look at me, and watching my every move. She did not appear to be fearful, and didn't fly away although she did have wings. After a few moments into our encounter, she began a rhythmic little dance, with her spikey arms held down and slightly open so you could see all the subtle gray-brown patterning and interlocking spikes. She kept her attention on me during this display (mantis eyes are mesmerizing) and she tapped the tip of her abdomen on the silver as she moved. The motions were all very subtle; I'm not sure what was being conveyed but it was riveting.

I thought it would be in her best interest to move her off of the car, as I had to leave shortly, so I reached my hand out to see if she would climb on, which she wasn't really interested in doing, so I picked her up very carefully and placed her on the nearby split rail fence that is covered with vines and left her there. She didn't move, but turned her face to watch me walk away. A little later she was gone. I had to wonder if she and the male we knew had crossed paths and had perhaps mated. If we ever see another praying mantis, we'll be thinking of these two. To us they will become the mythical origin mantises for all future generations of mantises seen at Birdsong from now on.

The Bird Window The Bird Window – the actual window - made it through the two recent hurricanes unscathed, thanks in large measure to Alan and Mike coming in on their days off to get it boarded up. The window is plate glass that was installed in 1958, so any threat of severe weather coming from the west always makes us uneasy. We breathe a sigh of relief when we come in to assess the aftermath of a storm and see the window intact. Thank you, Alan and Mike.

The change of seasons seemed to be taking its time, but now, after Helene, it really feels and looks like fall. The weather is substantially cooler, especially at night and in the early mornings, which we are all savoring and enjoying immensely. We are seeing this shift in bird presence and activity at the Bird Window, too. This is a rich time of year for wild food for birds and other wildlife - as mentioned above, there is an abundance of ripening berries, seeds, and fruit available out on the property. The birds who needed the supplemental seed at the Bird Window all summer to feed themselves and their offspring are now out taking full advantage of the bounty in the wild. So we are seeing less activity at the Window and the amount of food being eaten has dropped off dramatically in the past few weeks. By the end of the day, there is still a harrow disc nearly full of corn, and in spite of the squirrels and the bottomless-pit teenage raccoon, there is plenty of black oil sunflower seed left in the trough.

This is the time of year when, after a long summer of seeing a fairly predictable, but by no means boring, variety of summer residents, a visitor to the Window can be delighted by some completely unexpected birds on any given day. For example, last Tuesday afternoon, October 9th after a long day of event preparation, Lynn and I took a few minutes to sit at the Window with our binoculars and within a short period of time listed 16 different birds including a first year male Rose-breasted Grosbeak, a first year male Bay-breasted Warbler, a Tennessee Warbler, and a season's first immature male Yellow-bellied Sapsucker! Three Gray Catbirds were playing in the water and mister; one behaved just like a flycatcher. hovering and dipping. The following day, just walking by and taking a quick glance, there were two Ovenbirds stalking around the camellia with their odd little gait and beautiful orange striped heads. Here is the list we saw on the 16th: many Cardinals, Baybreasted Warbler (fall male and fall female), 3 Gray Catbirds, 2 Summer Tanagers, Blue Jays, Mockingbird, Tufted Titmouse, Gray-cheeked Thrush, Yellow -bellied Sapsucker, Tennessee Warbler, Ovenbird, Black-and-white Warbler, Redstart (immature male), Carolina Wren. Other recent sightings: Hooded Warbler, Wood Thrush, Red-eyed Vireo, and the Catbirds, Grosbeak, and Bay-breasted have been seen again!

The Ruby-throated Hummingbirds have not been seen at the Window since the 8<sup>th</sup> of October. Lynn is keeping the feeders filled for any stragglers in need of a meal on their way south. Typically, they leave around the week of October 13 to 20, so this is a little early. We were worried about the effects of Hurricane Helene and now Milton on the many thousands of birds that migrate this time of year. We hope that the cold front that has been actively steering the weather here in the last few weeks has been an advantage in some way to our migrants. We can vouch for the safe arrival of many lovely species and encourage you to come out and be surprised by a wonderful sighting sometime soon!

It is a busy, exuberant, colorful time of year to visit Birdsong. Going for a walk among all these intensely beautiful flowers displaying their most attractive selves to their ardent pollinators is an uplifting and joyful experience. You really get to see the personalities of our normally subtle green plants burst forth into their extroverted selves in the fall. Please take the opportunity to enjoy them at their most vivacious!




